Stages of Research Collaboration With APS Organizations

- Purpose of the report: provide direction regarding specific details of what researchers and APS staff may consider at each stage of collaboration.
 - Stage 1: Planning
 - Stage 2: Conducting the study
 - Stage 3: Results and publication

Stage 1: Planning

- Meet with APS staff to discuss agency's interest and ability and engage decision makers
- Considerations:
 - Hypothesis to be tested
 - Benefits from the research
 - Costs and time frames
 - Confidentiality of clients
 - Institutional Review Board (IRB)

Stage 2: Conducting the Study

- Consists of gathering, entering and analyzing the data
- Considerations:
 - Methodology is refined
 - IRB approvals obtained
 - Routine progress reports during data collection
 - Collected data entered into quantitative and/or qualitative analysis
 - Discussions regarding results and interpretation

Stage 3: Results and Publication

- After the data are collected and analyzed, representative meet
- Considerations:
 - Results of the study and impact on hypothesis
 - Determination of data to be publicly disseminated
 - Authorship and attributions
 - Prepare reports for publication

"The Abuse of Vulnerable Adults by Surrogate Decision Maker Perpetrators"

- Counties in Six State APS programs contributing deidentified case survey data and selected investigators participating in follow-up interviews
- Researching this form of elder abuse through analysis of substantiated APS cases of victimization perpetrated by surrogate decision makers and comparing these with substantiated cases perpetrated by non-surrogates

State of Maine, APS and University of Toronto Collaboration

 Evaluates an intervention model that works with both the older adult victim and perpetrator to strengthen the family and social systems surrtounding the victim-perpetrator dyad

Arizona APS and NCCD

 Conduct data analysis on APS population and engaged APS workers to use findings to customize assessment tools which inform practice and service level intensity.
